Northwest Minnesota Synod Assembly Re-cap

Nancy Bunde and Jewel Townsend attended this year's Synod Assembly on May 17 & 18 at Concordia College, Moorhead, MN. This year's NW MN ELCA Convention was relatively small and didn't have much controversy. We had really good key-note speakers, Pastor Jon Anderson from Luther Seminary, and Jill Beverlin, Program Director of the ELCA Coaching Ministry. At our Saturday morning worship we had a beautiful Pentecost service with a really cool scripture reading that included drums, beautiful singing (wow- all those church leaders sure can sing!), a sermon by Bishop Tesch, and during the service we commissioned 48 SAMs – some of which have been serving over 15 years, and some of which were brand new. We both went to different breakout sessions and this is what we would like to share:

Nancy: I attended a break-out session on Saturday that really spoke to me, by our keynote speaker for the convention, Jon Anderson, a pastor and professor at Luther Seminary who is the Rural Ministry Director and on the Faith+Lead team. The title of the workshop was "Digital Resources to Deepen Capacity and Widen Imagination". It may sound silly to have a Rural Ministry person talk about Digital Resources, but rural congregations using resources, already created and digitally available, saves time and money!! And why not share information within the rural congregation communities. Pastor Anderson shared information that showed this - Cultural Values of the Digital Age:

Proclamation Questions
Hierarchy Collaboration
In-Person Hybrid Connection

Passivity Creativity

Pastor Jon shared four points for congregations to consider:

- **1. Pivot in Posture:** from Fixing to Listening, Discerning, and Experimenting. Instead of "fixing" inherited structures in order to reverse the decline of institutional affiliation, participation and resources, churches should focus on discerning and joining the triune: God's presence and movement in their personal and congregational lives and in their neighborhoods.
- **2. Pivot in Focus:** from Membership to Discipleship. Churches that thrive will orient their communal culture around practices and relations that connect faith and daily life, answering questions of meaning, belonging, hope, and purpose
- **3. Pivot in Structure:** from One Shape Fits All to a Mixed Ecology. The term "church" conjures up a particular institutional expression (dedicated building, staff, programming focused on Sunday worship) The shift would be to mix Christian community that connect with people where they live, work and play.

4. Pivot in Leadership: from Clergy-Led/Lay Supported - to Lay-Led/Clergy Supported Ministry. We have an opportunity to reimagine leadership in ways that faithfully mobilize all the gifts of the body of Christ to participate in God's mission. I feel Esther is really good already at this point.

Jewel: I attended a Saturday morning session with our new synod Minister for Generosity, Keith Pearson. Keith had only been in the position a few days and we had officially commissioned him to the position on Friday night. Going into this session I thought it was going to be some number-crunching, money-pushing presentation, but it was quite the opposite and beautifully led. I had seen Pastor Keith previously at a Luther Crest event, because for the past nearly five years he has served our synod as our Regional Gift Planner with the ELCA Foundation, providing consultation and resources to our various ministries in the areas of endowments and planned giving.

Keith's presentation was: Why do you support the church?

He asked for reasons from the participants. Some of the answers shared were:

- It's my obligation
- I need to pay my fair share
- It's a service to me
- It's something essential that you can't get anywhere else
- It's something I want everyone else to have

Pastor Keith spoke about how the church is not a business, and it is not the building we are in – the church is the congregation of people. He gave the example, that he is a musician and author, so he is always concerned about copyright laws. His congregation was going to be doing a worship service at a park somewhere else in his community, so he was concerned that because they weren't in the "church" (building/property), they would violate the copyright laws for the music they were going to play. After some research, he found that the federal government does not recognize the "church" as the building or property, but wherever the congregation meets. So if that's how even the government understands the "church", why do we get so caught up in the building or property? It's kind of like that song – "We are the Church", that we sang just a few weeks ago in worship at Esther. He also said that while we can learn some things from other non-profits, churches have their own non-profit category, and really cannot be compared to a business or even a nonprofit, as the services we provide are much different than either of those types of entities. He also mentioned that we tend to always get hung up on keeping the lights on and keeping the buildings repaired. When what really is our main purpose as a congregation? It was the second time in the past month that I heard the phrase, "you have to remember that none of those churches that Paul wrote all those letters to and started up, are still going today." However, look at how the Good News spread from those first, early churches to the entire world!

He then used that same list from before and asked that we do a mind-shift of the order of importance of the list, and shared these thoughts:

1. **It's something I want everyone else to have** – now, tomorrow and well into the future. How welcoming are we to new people, or people that aren't "like us"? The time we spend together at church is vital to our well-being. The things we learn about Jesus, the faith journeys we are on with one another, and the care we provide to our congregations and communities are important to us and what we want for others. Where do I put my treasure? Where my heart is!

- 2. **It's an essential service that you can't get anywhere else** one lady spoke up and said, "I can't get my sins forgiven anywhere else!" We come together to praise God, lift each other up in prayer, support one another, share food and fellowship, and essentially "fill up our cup" so we can go out into the world to be the hands and feet of Jesus to others.
- 3. **My fair share** not everyone may be able to contribute the same amount. Those who have been blessed with healthy financial situations, probably were not always in that same situation. Everyone is in a different financial situation, and at different points in their lives. It does not make one person more important than someone else due to what they can contribute. We need to welcome everyone and be sure that everyone has a voice in our congregations. We also need to remember that it is not just by monetary contributions that people give. We give of our time, talents and treasure.
- 4. **My obligation** while we don't want this to be our main reason for supporting our congregations, obligation, to many, means commitment. Committing financially to our congregations ensures we are able to continue to provide worship and other services to our faith community to help us in sharing the Good News with others.

At the end of the presentation, we had a wonderful discussion with a couple of gals that were in the session, from the Holmes City church that has the Farmer's Market every Saturday during the summer. They said that their "little problem" was that they serve over 400 people breakfast every Saturday from mid-May to mid-October, however there are only about 24 people in church on any given Sunday. "What are we doing wrong?" This got the group in a big discussion that made us almost late for worship – but it was a great discussion about seeds being planted and souls being fed.

We had a wonderful time and would like to encourage each of you to visit the tables by the office to see some of the literature that we brought back from the Assembly. If you have any questions please let us know – we would be happy to share even more about some of the other presentations. For instance, Peoples' Church in Bemidji, which is part of our synod, just received a government grant to expand their building and the services that they provide for their community, which was lifted up in thankful praise at the Assembly!




The PORK CHOP FEED SIGN-UP is on the narthex table for workers and for making pans of bars for the event.
